Prior Learning

The Year 8 programme of study in Personal Development builds our student's Yr7 experience of the range of curriculum topics as highlighted in the curriculum intent.

Curriculum Intent - What are the curriculum aims?

Students will explore what makes a relationship in a range of contexts as part of the new RSE and Health Education statutory regulation from September 2020. Students will also begin to learn about their own safety when around others and consider what is acceptable behaviour or unacceptable behaviour both legally and morally.

Pupils will develop their personal wellbeing by studying with wellbeing and mental health. This is designed to be implemented at a time when students of this age are beginning to develop more independence both in terms of personal choices affecting wellbeing and being more independent when being out without a responsible adult.

Students will understand that there are different categories of law, broadly defined as criminal and civil and that there are different court systems to support the upholding of such laws. Students will learn about what constitutes a crime and consider specific examples of crime that they are most likely to be a victim of. In timetabled lessons, this includes knife crime.

Students will understand and appreciate the importance of the diversity of the UK population. This will include understanding the history of immigration to the UK and how the UK (like most high-income countries) has developed into a multicultural society. Students will also become more aware of the issues and tensions that such a diverse society must overcome and how to deal with different points of view on controversial issues. We want students to be challenged that this is a complex issue and that arguments on all sides should be engaged with. This will be challenging to many students with strongly held views on the specific examples/case studies used in this unit. Pupils should also be aware of the difference between multiculturalism as a realistic description of the modern UK and as a philosophy that has been actively pursued by governments. This unit also explores how to develop resilience to extreme views and recognise extreme views when they occur. This unit also therefore support the School's teaching of the fundamental British values.
