Prior Learning

The Year 7 French curriculum does not require any prior learning from Primary School but will build seamlessly on any previous knowledge, as well as challenge those pupils who have acquired any French beforehand. Listening, Speaking, Reading and Writing activities help to introduce the basics of the French language through vocabulary, grammar, culturally focused exercises.

Curriculum Intent – What are the curriculum aims?

The Year 7 French curriculum aims to equip students with a foundation of the French language through the four main skills of Listening, Speaking, Reading and Writing. During Year 7, we will start to use the present tense and basic opinions whilst developing strategies to cope with new, unfamiliar language. The modules studied are designed to provide a window to the Francophone world, covering themes that are relevant to the lives of young people. Key cultural themes such as Festivals, Literature or The Arts are also introduced, providing students with a well-rounded appreciation of France and French speaking countries as well as the language.

		Where you live, types of houses, rooms in a house, bedroom	
		objects, daily routine, household chores.	



Curriculum Impact - How will progress be assessed?

Informally, student work is marked regularly; students also receive feedback in lesson via class and personalised, focused discussions. Formal assessment is via a series of half-termly short assessments, covering a selection of the skills each time of Listening, Speaking, Reading and Writing.
